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The Scory Behind the Cover Illumination

Christine de Pizan is widely regarded as one of Europe's earliest female professional authors, and is certainly one of the most prolific. Born in Venice in 1365, she moved to Paris as a young child when her father was appointed the royal astrologer and alchemist to King Charles V of France. Christine took advantage of the intellectual atmosphere of the court, making use of the royal library to teach herself languages, history, and literature. Her writing career began at the age of 24, after her husband, a royal secretary, died suddenly, and she was faced with the necessity of providing for herself and her small children. She soon attracted the patronage of a number of nobles at court, and produced dozens of major works over the next three decades, along with hundreds of ballads and poems. Cooks Guild: Baroness Wynne— The Bright Hills Cooks Guild met at the home of Brienna and Gustav on Sunday, 9 October. What a great meeting! We welcomed a new member, Leah, who is friend to Alexander. New members, new ideas are always welcome!

Naturally our first actions were to set out the food provided by guild members. One never goes

away from a guild meeting hungry! Our hosts provided two birthday menu items...bread and the "corn" dish. It was agreed that these were more than acceptable for our baronial birthday feast.

The first order of business was the hospitality tables at Crown Tourney for both their Majesties and the baronial populace pavilions.

Lord Cormacc ua Rigan is in charge of the field and an e-mail has been sent to him asking about the proximity of the royal pavilion location to electrical outlets. I will pass on his answer to the guild when it comes. Other questions that have answers forthcoming is pavilion set-up time; Friday night perhaps, do we need to bring table or will they be provided, and when will be able to tear down the tables.

We have been given a head count of 80 (at the most) feast seats. The menu, which was posted with last month's minutes. Anglo-Saxon Doetry

hat do you think of when Anglo-Saxon poetry is mentioned? If you are like most people, you think of "Beowulf". You may also think of lots of words that use similar sounds. Although "Beowulf" is an Anglo-Saxon poem which does use a lot of similar sounds, Anglo-Saxon poetry is so much more! There are riddles, love poems, religious poems, tales of historically verified battles, charms and even a poem recording the names and meanings of runes. The poetry is sometimes solemn and sometimes silly.

The Anglo-Saxon era ranged from the middle of the fifth to the middle of the twelfth century and was brought to an end when William the Conqueror defeated King Harold.

The known extant Anglo-Saxon poetry is mostly found in four manuscripts: the Exeter Book, the Nowell Codex, the Vercelli Book and the Junius Manuscript. It is believed that these manuscripts were written between 950 and 1025 A.D. The underlying poems are believed to have been orally composed during the preceding 300 years. Most of the poems were written in the Latin alphabet, although some fragments are written in fuborc¹ (futhorc) which are commonly called runes.

Anglo-Saxon poetry was oral poetry, meant to be heard, not necessarily read. When it was put in writing, no poetic structure was included. It was just written as paragraphs. However, a written poetic structure makes is easier for many people to hear the rhythms of the poetry. The sound of the poetry dictates the written form. The sound of most Anglo-Saxon poetry dictates a written format of half lines to help us hear the rhythms of Anglo-Saxon poetry even when it is not being recited. Verse lengths do not appear to be standardized.

Anglo-Saxon poetry was primarily derived from Old High German forms, although Latin forms had some influence. Like the Old High German poetry, most Anglo-Saxon poetry is alliterative; that is to say that it has head rhyme. We are more familiar with end rhyme or tail rhyme where the words end with similar sounds. One simple example of end rhyme is: My heart filled with dread when I saw Alfred lying dead. It is easy to recognize that the words ending in the *ed* sound rhyme even if they are not spelled consistently because rhyme is based on sound and we are used to this type of rhyme.

Alliteration is just as obvious once you know what it is. Alliteration is using words with identical consonant sounds at the beginning of the words. A simple example of alliteration, or head rhyme is: Boldly and bravely Brythnoth fought. I have bolded the letter "b" to indicate that this is the alliteration. As you can see, it is at the beginning or head of the words and is easy to spot. Alliteration using vowels is also simple. Any vowel at the beginning of a word alliterates with any other vowel at the beginning of another word. An example of this is: Igor entreated Olaf to leave. Here the long "e" sound of Igor alliterates with the short "e" sound of entreated and with the long "o" sound of Olaf.

Can you just toss alliteration anywhere in the line and call it an Anglo-Saxon poem? Some people do, but it isn't really an Anglo-Saxon poem unless it follows the rules about where alliteration occurs and the length and structure of the lines. Generally, Anglo-Saxon poetry is broken down into two half lines with a caesura or pause between the halves. Thus the line written about Brythnoth would be written:

Boldly and **b**ravely **B**rythnoth fought.

Each line usually has four main stresses. In this case the stresses are on bold, brave, Bryth and fought. The alliteration is found in the first, second and third emphasized syllables. This is a standard approach in Anglo-Saxon poetry. Generally, the first and/or second emphasized syllables alliterate with the third emphasized syllable. The fourth emphasized syllable usually does not alliterate. However, there are exceptions. The alliteration may be on an unstressed syllable or there may be alliteration in the fourth stressed syllable. However, as far as I have seen, the alliteration is always based on the third emphasized syllable in a line.

The Latin influence was seen in were occasional Anglo-Saxon poems that used rhyme instead of alliteration. At least one is extant (exists today) which has been named The Riming Poem by modern scholars. An interesting feature of this poem is that it rhymes within the lines, as well as between the lines. The following four lines are from the original Anglo-Saxon poem now known as the rhyming poem:

Line number

Me lifes onl ah	se þis leoht onwr ah ,	1
ond þæt torhte geteoh,	tillice onwr ah .	2
Glæd wæs ic gliw um ,	glenged hiw um ,	3
blissa bleo um ,	blostma hiw um .	4

The rhymes are in bold. You can see that the last syllable of lines 1 and 2 rhyme. Additionally, the last syllable in each half line of line 1 rhymes but either they do not rhyme or there is a slant or almost rhyme in line 2. The last syllable of lines 3 and 4 also rhyme. However, the last syllable in each half line of both lines 3 and 4 rhymes. One of these two patterns continues throughout the poem. The rhyming pattern reminds me of Norse alliteration patterns.

Acrostics are poems in which the first letter of each line, verse or strophe forms words. The abecedarian is a specialized form of acrostic that uses the letters of the alphabet in order. This form of poetry was popular in early and medieval Latin verse and was even used in the Bible. These poets may have influenced the Anglo-Saxon poet who wrote The Rune Poem. Each verse of The Rune Poem begins with, and explains, the letters of the runic alphabet in order.

Repetition of words, phrases or strophes was used by some Latin poets during the medieval period and may have been used earlier. Deor is an Anglo-Saxon poem written about several apparently well-known people. Deor uses a single verse for each person and ends every verse with the same line.

Anglo-Saxon poetry also played with language by using multiple names for the same thing and by using kennings. Kennings are noun substitutes with three parts; a base word, determinant and referent. The base word is a noun. The determinant is often possessive and modifies the base word. The referent is the noun that is being discussed without being named. One example of a kenning is *battle-worm*. *Worm* is the noun and the base word. What kind of worm is it? It is a *battle* worm. So battle is the determinant that changes the meaning of worm. Finally, *sword* is the noun that is really being discussed, so it is the referent.

Few now read Anglo-Saxon and I found no modern interpretations that truly gave the flavor of an Anglo-Saxon poem, so I decided to write one. I was surprised to discover that I had written an Old Norse poem instead. So I rewrote it as an Anglo-Saxon poem. Which do you like best? For a challenge, you can try to find the kennings and understand what they mean.

Cornish (Devonian) Pastys

The oldest recorded Cornish Pasty recipe dates from 1746, and record of a pasty is found in an audit in Devon dated 1509¹ which says, "Itm for the cooke is labor to make the pasties 10d." (see picture, right)

References to the word pasty date back to the 1200s, but refer to any number of baked goods.²

This is a savory dish made with a shortcrust dough and a savory filling.

Pastry

500 g strong bread flour 120 g solid fat (shortening, lard, suet, or schmaltz) 25 g unsalted margarine or butter 5 g salt 175 g cold water

Mix salt and flour, and then grate the frozen fat and margarine into the flour, and work until it resembles coarse cookie crumbs.

Slowly add the **ice cold** water, and work the dough until it pulls together enough to pull off the walls of the mixing container.

Place dough in a cold place (cooler or refrigerator) for at least an hour tightly wrapped.

Beef Filling:

450 g good quality beef (skirt), chicken, or other animal based protein

450 g red potato

250 g Swede (Rutabaga)

200 g onion

4 tsp minced garlic

Salt & pepper to taste

Slice ingredients to about a 1/8" thickness by 1/2" x 1/2".

Roll out he dough into 4 equal balls, and then flatten into disks about ½"-¼" thick, and then add filling by layering, from bottom to top, with Swede, beef, potato, onion, and garlic, putting salt and pepper on each layer as you lay them out.

Seal with an egg wash, and crimp along the side (Cornish) or along the top (Devonian), cut vent holes, and then paint the top side of the pasty with an egg wash.

Bake at 400°F for hour, until the pastry is a golden brown, and shiny from the egg wash.


Allow to rest for at least 10 minutes before eating. Otherwise, you will likely burn your mouth.

It is traditional to eat with a hot English mustard, both this and a Dijon are next to the pasties.

Chicken Filling (Not a part of the competition)

As per beef, except that brined chicken strips are used.

Brine for 30 minutes to 2 hours.



Brine Recipe

2 cups water

1 tbsp kosher salt (1½ tsp table salt)

1½ tbsp brown sugar

2 Bay Leaves

¼ tsp oregano

½ tsp tarragon

Bring water, salt, and sugar to a boil. When everything is dissolved, take off the heat, and add the spices. Place in refrigerator to cool down.

Dessert Pasties

Pastry

Recipe and preparation as above

Apple Filling

1 Granny Smith Apples, peeled and cut thin

1 tbsp lemon juice

1 tsp (or cube) crushed ginger

½ tsp cinnamon

2 tbsp sugar

1 small pinch kosher salt

1 tsp arrowroot

Mix lemon juice, salt, and arrowroot thoroughly, and then toss with the rest of ingredients and allow to marinate.

Blackberry Filling

1/2 cup blackberries

2 tbsp sugar

1 tsp lemon juice

1 tsp (cube) ginger

1 small pinch kosher salt

1 tsp arrowroot

Mix lemon juice, salt, and arrowroot thoroughly, and then toss with the rest of ingredients and allow to marinate.

Preparation:

Divide the dough into 8 parts and add filling. I will be doing Apple, Blackberry, and a mix.

Seal with an egg wash, and crimp along the side, and brush egg wash on top.

Liberally sprinkle the top with sugar, and cut vent holes.

Bake at 400°F for hour, until the pastry is a golden brown, and shiny from the egg wash and sugar.


