The Story Behind the Cover Image

St. Swithun was an Anglo-Saxon Bishop from the 9th century who is overshadowed by a myth/legend about 40 days of rain for moving his remains from outside the church to inside and posthumous miracle-working. According to tradition if it rains on his feast day, 15 July then it will do so for 40 days. St Swithun's symbols are apples and raindrops, the cover image beautifully depicted in a stained glass window at St Swithin's church in Frettenham, Norfolk. Pennsic Wars July 27 – August 12, 2018 Mayor: TH Lord Tommaso Valeriano

Pennsic is an annual event, in the guise of a "War", between the Kingdoms of the East and the Middle of the Society for Creative Anachronism Pennsic is also the largest Society event, with attendance in recent years exceeding 10,000. The scheduled activities include large melee battles, tournaments, archery, stage performances, dancing, and hundreds of classes on medieval topics. The marketplace has over 200 merchants selling a variety of wares.

Coopers' Lake Campground is a 500-acre site, located in Slippery Rock, PA. The campground has several shower houses and restrooms, and many porta-johns are rented for the event. Water spigots are adjacent to most camping areas. There is a well-stocked camp store. The campground has a laundry room, 2 ATMs, and a playground. In nearby New Castle and Butler there are restaurants, supermarkets, motels, laundromats, and other stores. Moraine State Park, not far from the campground, has public swimming facilities.

The opening weekend of Pennsic is the last Saturday in July, and the event runs for 2 weeks. If you decide to attend Pennsic for the full two weeks, there will certainly be plenty for you to do. But if you can only make it for a week or less, you'll want to be there during the second week, as that's when the battles and most other events are scheduled. A listing of the dates of future Pennsics is on-line.

The opening weekend is known as "Land Grab".

Some people refer to the first week of Pennsic as "Peace Week", since there are no War Point battles scheduled. There is still plenty to do: the Merchant areas are open, Pennsic University classes & Artisans' Row start mid-week, and by the end of the week most other activities are underway, including performances, tournaments, archery, dancing, & children's activities.

"War Week" begins with Opening Ceremonies – a grand procession of all the kingdoms to the Battlefield, where war is declared and each kingdom announces on whose side they will fight. All the War Point battles take place this week, along with Kingdom Courts and a majority of the activities.

Tartys In Applis

recipe by Daniel Myers

It seems a bit unusual to grate apples, and it does make this recipe a bit messier to make than the typical fruit tart. Still, it's a quick and easy apple pie, and it tastes delicious.

Ingredients

4 - 5 apples
6 figs, chopped
1/4 cup raisins
1 1/2 tsp. powder douce
1/4 tsp. salt
pinch saffron
Short Paest for Tarts



Method

Peel, core, and grate apples. Add figs, raisins, and spices. Mix well and put into tart crust. Bake at 350° until done, about 40 minutes. Serve warm or cold.

Weather it Rain or Whether it Won't tales of St. Swithun

A standing joke worldwide is the English preoccupation with the weather. So how did it come to pass that the English summer should be determined by a long dead Anglo-Saxon Bishop known as St. Swithun?

Saint Swithun was born in Kingdom of Wessex (an Anglo-Saxon Kingdom in the South-West and the precursor to the unified Kingdom of England) and educated in Winchester, the Kingdom's capital. and was ordained priest by Helmstan. King Egbert appointed him as tutor of his son, Æthelwulf (Alfred the Great), and considered Swithun one of his chief friends. In 852, Ceolnoth, Archbishop of Canterbury, consecrated Swithun as bishop of Winchester, it is suspected that this appointment was made at the King Æthelwulf request. In his new office he was known for his piety and his zeal in building new churches or restoring old ones. At his request Æthelwulf gave a tenth of the lands of Wessex to the Church as documented on ancient parchments with their signatures. William of Malmesbury adds that Bishop Ealhstan of Sherborne was considered Æthelwulf's minister for temporal matters, but it was Swithun who he conferred with as minister for spiritual matters.

Among the few things we know about Swithun is that he made his diocesan journeys on foot and when he gave a banquet he invited the poor and not the rich. Swithun won the affection of his folk among whom he labored for the better part of a decade. He was famous for building bridges, churches and planting apple trees. Patterning himself after Christ Jesus, he gave gifts to the poor and needy. Only one miracle is attributed to Swithun while he was alive. An old lady's eggs had been maliciously smashed by workmen building a church. Swithin picked the broken eggs up and, it is said, they miraculously became whole again.

Bishop Swithun died on 2 July 862 and according to William of Malmesbury that on his dieing bed left instructions that his body should be buried outside the church by the north wall of the Old Winchester Cathedral, *ubi et pedibus praetereuntium et stillicidiis ex alto rorantibus esset obnoxius* [where it might be subject to the feet of passers-by and to the raindrops pouring from on high]. His body lay there peacefully for about a century.

On 15 July 971 when the monastic reform movement had been established and religion was once again at the forefront, Æthelwold of Winchester, the current Bishop of Winchester, and Dunstan, Archbishop of Canterbury, decreed that Swithun was to be the patron saint of the restored Cathedral at Winchester where an impressive shrine was built for him. Swithun's body was removed from its simple grave and interred. However, the removal was also accompanied by ferocious and violent rain storms that lasted 40 days and 40 nights and is said to indicate the saint's displeasure at being moved, and thus this well know piece of verse came about:

St. Swithun's day if thou dost rain

For forty days it will remain


St. Swithun's day if thou be fair

For forty days 'twill rain no more.

When Swithun's remains were transferred to the cathedral, many people claimed miraculous cures. The common folk regarded this as proof he had indeed been a saint. One such miracle was his appearance to Queen Ælfgifa (or Emma as she is also known), mother of Edward the Confessor. This was on the night before her 'ordeal', a trial for her supposed adultery with Aelfwine, former Bishop of Winchester, which involved walking across hot blades at Winchester Cathedral. St Swithun supposedly told Queen Ælfgifa "I am Saint Swithun whom you have invoked; fear not, the fire shall do you no hurt." The following day, the Queen was able to walk barefoot across the blades completely unharmed. The miraculous work of Saint Swithun, and of course, her innocence.



A typical Medieval cult grew up around him. Swithun's tomb became one of the most popular pilgrimage sites in England. Pieces of his body were borrowed for other shrines, his head going to Canterbury and an arm to Peterborough Abbey. In *Aelfric's Lives of Saints* it states people would travel to the site in hopes of miracles and dozens of them are listed from healing broken bones to eyes being replaced and illness being cured. A short tunnel (the Holy Hole) allowed them to crawl right under his shrine, as close as possible to his miraculous healing powers.



Swithun's body was moved into yet another Winchester church in the following century. It remained in this final home until the Reformation. The cult of St Swithun and his shrine came to an abrupt end during the Reformation, when King Henry VIII seized control of the Catholic Church in England, and declared himself head of the Church of England. They considered it idolatry to bow and pray at such shrines and unnecessary anyhow, because Christians are free to go directly to God through Christ.

On 21 September 1538, under cover of darkness at 3am in the morning, the king's commissioners smashed it apart, and stole all the valuables. Three years later, a workman stopped up the Holy Hole. Nothing remains of his once great shrine today, but you can see a modern memorial that marks the spot.

15 July is when the feast of St. Swithin occurs still to this day. The emblems of St. Swithin refer to the legend of the forty days' rain (raindrops) and the apples from the trees he planted. Oddly enough apple-growers hope for a good soaking or christening

from the saint on this day. This is because they believe that the 'saints are watering the crops.' If they fail to do so, the apple-crop will be a poor one. Furthermore, no apple should be picked or eaten before July 15th. The other side of the superstition is that apple-growers believe all apples still growing at St Swithin's day will ripen fully.

Whether you choose to believe that this simple home grown saint caused it to rain because he didn't like being moved indoors or that he is simply christening the apples doesn't matter, because even to this day the weather forecasters still watch to see if the weather is going to be balmy or clear. In fact the Royal Meteorological Society believes that there is a grain of truth in the myth, as weather often locks into a pattern in high summer, only changing when autumn begins to rear its head from the end of August.

So what is the weather going to be this year? It will be a mixed picture of sunshine and showers and will continue as such for the foreseeable future, with warm sunshine punctuated by storms and showers. In other words pretty much like every other summer.

Helpful Camping Hints - Part 1

As I was looking for information that would be helpful as you prepare for Pennsic I came across an article about camping which I thought I might bring to you in bite-sized pieces. *Scholastica*

Security

Unfortunately the modern world has not totally ignored the SCA. At large events there are very real possibilities of criminal happenings. You can do a number of things to avoid or minimize the opportunities to be a victim of these happenings.

- Do not carry large sums of cash on your person or leave them in your tent. Travelers checks are your friend. If you do have to have a large sum of cash on hand secure it in your car or a really unlikely hiding place in your tent. Same thing goes for purse, wallet, credit cards, security badges, etc. Think of some place really icy—no, not a port-a-john—and hide things there. Put them in a zip-lock bag if it's some place that things get damp.
- Do not go out alone at night.
- Do not leave valuables such as swords and jewelry near the edges of your tent. Hands can slip under the edge and snitch things.
- Do install a "door bell" on your tent. WHAT?!? A door bell? Hang a string of bells on the tent wall INSIDE the tent. Should someone try to enter your tent or disturb a wall—the bells will sound. This is such an unlikely sound in a tent that it wakes most folks up fairly easily.
- Do keep a sword, broom, or ball bat near at hand at night. With luck you'll never need it. If you only need it once it will be worth its weight in gold. And you don't need a carry permit for a broom.

Safety

- Fire is very much a part of SCA camping. We have fire pits, tiki torches, lanterns, hibachi's, charcoal grills, braziers, candles and propane stoves. We got FIRE.
- When placing torches make sure they are at least 3 feet further away from your tent, the ropes and the camp wall than they are tall. If they fall this gives you a minimum safe distance between the torch and anything it can burn.
- Do not leave anything unattended when it is burning.
- Do not close up your tent while keeping a lit candle, brazier or other heat/light source in your tent. Allow for GOOD ventilation if you have something burning in your tent.
- Always douse fires with water after you have extinguished the flame.
- If it was a particularly large fire, you should also stir and break up the leftover wood or coals in the fire pit. Sand also works to smother a smoldering fire.
- Keep a bucket of sand or water outside your tent. Just in case.
- Keep a fire extinguisher inside your tent. Once a year have them inspected. If dead then replace them.
- Mark your ropes with something colorful if they extend a long distance out from your tent or spray paint your tent pegs.
- Carry a first aid kit. Have your preferred over-the-counter medications in it. Check it yearly for expiration dates. Good things to have camping are burn cream, suntan & sunburn lotion, bee sting remedies, band-aids, moleskin for blisters, and in summer—fighters often need salt tablets.
- Dehydration and sunburn are the two most common afflictions at Pennsic. Plan for them.





Byzantine Matters by Averil Cameron

For many of us, Byzantium remains "byzantine"—obscure, marginal, difficult. Despite the efforts of some recent historians, prejudices still deform popular and scholarly understanding of the Byzantine civilization, often reducing it to a poor relation of Rome and the rest of the classical world. In this book, renowned historian Averil Cameron presents an original and personal view of the challenges and questions facing historians of Byzantium today.

The result is a forthright and compelling call to reconsider the place of Byzantium in Western history and imagination.


